The briefer addressed three issues about Afghanistan: the political insecurity, with a centralized power in the hands of the Taliban; the humanitarian situation, with about 70% of the Afghan people having their rights violated; and the restrictions imposed by the de facto government to Afghan women who work for the UN in the country. Even though the rise of the Taliban was preceded by the withdrawal of the US troops from Afghanistan, the country highlighted their success on peacekeeping and counterterrorism in Afghanistan, contrasting their interventions with former actions perpetrated by the Soviet Union in the past. The UNSC considered human rights violations as a recurring problem in Afghanistan, through explicit and implicit violence, especially against women and children. As mentioned by the briefer, the UN Assistance Mission in Afghanistan was severely compromised by the ban on Afghan women's work, jeopardizing the functioning of the mission. As the delegate of the Russian Federation pointed out, the countries with the greatest international power are making decisions unilaterally, going against consensus, which in turn is the main objective of the Council. Then, the Swiss delegates highlighted that economic problems have seriously affected the Afghan population and that the situation was worsened by the economic sanctions imposed by co-penholders suggested multiple issues to be addressed. Whilst Japan recalled the importance of defending human rights and looking after refugees and stateless people, the UAE brought up people as the focus of the discussion, also looking forward to enhancing female access to education. Nevertheless, Council Members highlighted more incisive actions. Ecuador asked the briefer if a new military intervention in Afghanistan was a possibility since the Afghan delegation, as an observer in the Council, asked for military help from Western countries. The briefer replied that the UN strongly discourages this kind of measure in Afghanistan.

the Western powers. In their statements, delegations also point out that the Council is willing to achieve and resolve Afghanistan's problems. peace However, the Council is not paying attention to the country's particularities and not considering Afghanistan's ownership. The United States, for example, prioritized dialogue as the primary means of diplomacy. Nevertheless, US delegates seemed to forget that their country intervened, in a military manner, in many other States, on numerous occasions, without using dialogue as the primary means. On the other hand. Brazil stressed the importance of a resolution that addresses socially vulnerable groups, such as children who are used as soldiers.

Highlights from Committees and Councils

University Security Council

During the first session, practically all Member States opted to deliver statements during the Formal Session, openly expressing their positions regarding Afghanistan. A predominant theme, especially among the rotative members, was the concern over ongoing cases of terrorist attacks, a matter underscored by the UNSC Briefer in her remarks. She also expressed concern about the violations of women's rights, especially the right to education. During their statements, the rotative members emphasized the importance of mutual trust for cooperation. The delegate of Ecuador highlighted that the UN Charter is the same for

both the Western and Eastern worlds and should be interpreted impartially. Nevertheless, the debate was largely dominated by the P-5, particularly the United States and Russia. The delegate of the United States called for a more diplomatic stance from the Taliban and even stated a willingness to recognize its legitimacy, provided it assumes its responsibilities and obligations. However, the United States did not specify what these responsibilities would entail nor did it outline the terms for recognition. On the other hand, Russia suggested the invocation of Chapter VII of the UN Charter, ending the day with tension among the Council Members.
