At the UNSC 1 stakeouts, tension arose between Malta and Slovenia. While the first claimed broad alignment, the former revealed an unclear consensus among members. Algeria labeled the human rights violations against Palestinian children as "genocide". The UK insisted they're not directly funding arms for the ongoing conflict, while Palestine pleaded for a fresh solution to the non-stop violence.

At the UNSC 2 stakeouts, UNRWA condemned Israel's "unfounded allegations" against its work and praised those upholding its funding, urging the USA to restore its contributions. Palestine also focused on the USA. accusing them of hypocrisy for defending children while funding weapons used on them. Switzerland pushed for another attempt at the failed two-state solution. The trend reveals a fractured focus on children's needs amid political maneuvering. Can the international community unite to address them?
