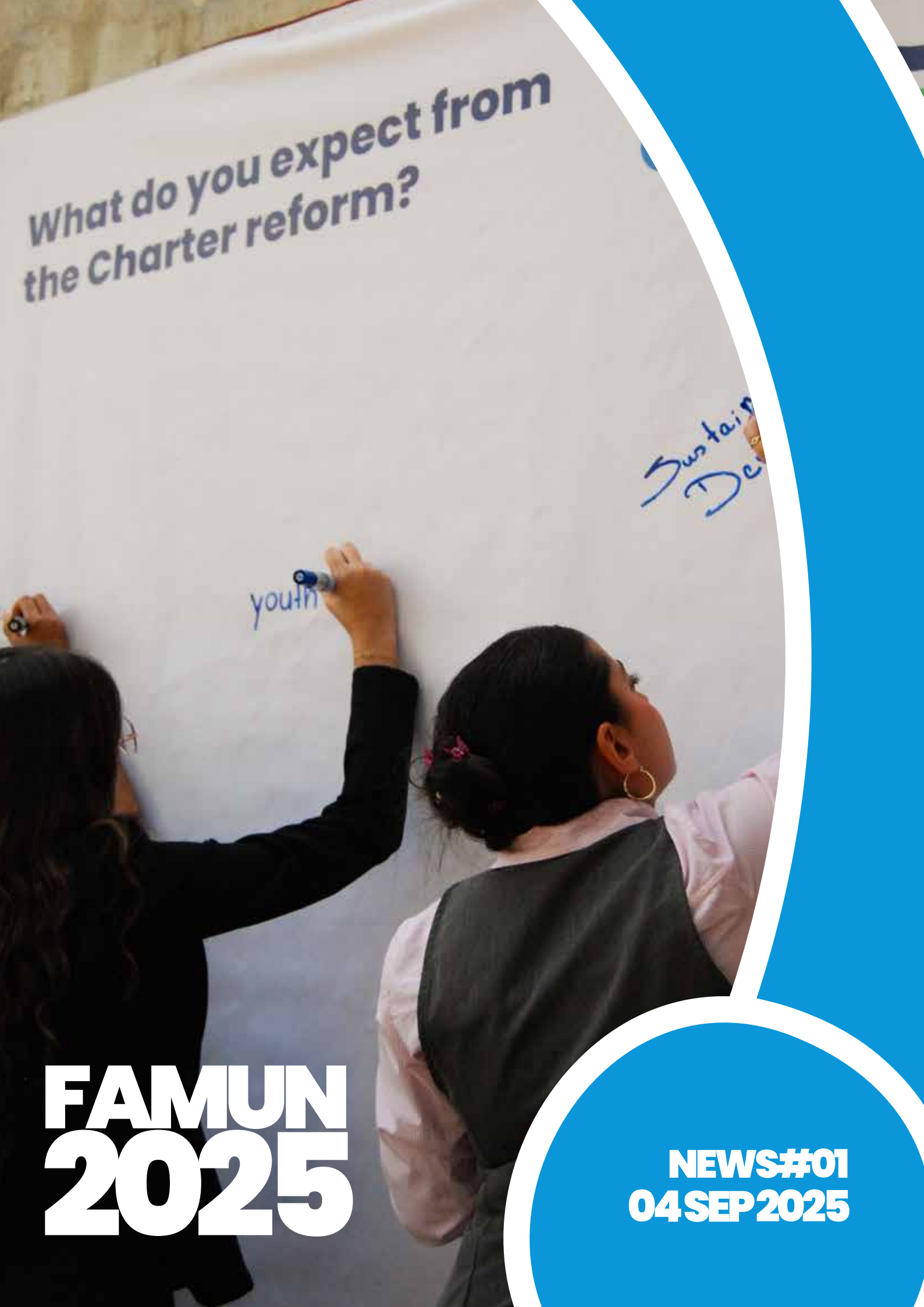

FAMUN 2025 mobilizes young people for a new UN Charter

Youth claims to renew multilateralism for the 21st century

Besides the weakening of multilateralism, the UN faces an institutional crisis. Its Charter fails to address contemporary challenges, ranging from the climate crisis to technological changes, humanitarian crises, and new global threats. It is in this context that FAMUN 2025 makes history as the first simulation to align academic experience with youth activism, in partnership with the UN Charter Reform Coalition – Article 109. The message from the Coalition's Director, Ms. Heba Ally, during the Opening Ceremony was clear: "Simulation is mobilization". Inspired by her words, the Senior Secretariat refuses to remain silent: "If students can inspire change and push for a new Charter, so can global leaders – so we urge Member States to assume their responsibility".

To reform the UN Charter, young people must lead! Everyone has a role in shaping the world and we urge individual and collective action for solutions to renew multilateralism and the UN.

The Opening Ceremony and Plenary of FAMUN 2025 set an inspiring tone, urging all to dare imagine a better world. The Russian Federation, a key instigator in one of today's conflicts, proudly proclaimed its commitment to peace, yet actively disrupts peace through its veto power. The promise of "We the Peoples" stands at odds with the silence and inaction we witness. Youth Representatives Lucas Neves condemned this silence on global crises, while Avril Ramirez, a Venezuelan immigrant, told her story of hardship and resilience, calling for a united mission toward real human dignity. Their critical voices spark hope, positioning youth as true protagonists of the future we aim to inherit, while UN Member States betray their own commitments.
